Headmasters Report

It has been an extraordinary week in the life of St. Stanislaus' College. On Wednesday August 27th more than 20 media organisations descended on the School for comment and coverage material related to the allegations of serious sexual misconduct towards children at Stannies in 1986. Film crews were at both entrances interviewing students as they came and went from the school and film crews also tapped on car windows to interview parents and students in the process of dropping off and collecting children. A media helicopter hovered about the school grounds and film and other media crews sought to interview students and others in bus shelters and on the various streets of Bathurst. The School itself formally provided information and responses non-stop to more than 20 media organisations from 6.30am until the last group were farewelled just before 7pm. Some elements of the coverage were most concerning with sometimes little regard for due process in covering serious allegations which continue to be investigated by the police and which are currently before the courts. Our continuing position is that we strongly support the process of thoroughly investigating these allegations and to that end we have continued to co-operate and liaise with the police. The school received telephone calls from Superintendent Michael Goodwin and Acting Inspector Lance McFawn emphasising that the police greatly appreciated and recognised the co-operative support that had been provided to the police by St Stanislaus' College. We were grateful to receive such public comments after person or persons unknown had provided misleading information to the media suggesting that the school had been unco-operative with authorities. In difficult and complex situations it remains vital for the truth to be pursued.

The school finds any sexual misconduct towards children to be abhorrent and repellent and is committed to ensuring that any allegations involving such misbehaviour are thoroughly and comprehensively dealt with by the Courts and by the police. In dealing with such allegations, it is vital that due process is followed or else we become a community where the whim of the powerful and those with the loudest voices become the sole arbiters of the truth. We will continue to work closely with the police, the courts and the other relevant authorities.

In the period since Wednesday, we have received a very great number of messages, letters and emails of support from current parents, former parents, old boys and friends of St. Stanislaus' College. We have greatly appreciated these sentiments and the sheer volume of them at such a difficult time. The overwhelming number of messages have had the following as an ongoing theme and it is one that we whole heartedly support. The responses have essentially expressed the hope that:

- justice be done
- that those in need of support, receive it; and
- that St. Stanislaus' College meets the challenge of this fierce storm with wisdom and integrity.

May we find the way for the above to be so.

INDOOR ASSEMBLY

Yesterday we hosted a further indoor assembly. These assemblies, as I have conveyed regularly in the past, often profile some very special work completed by our students. The outstanding item of yesterday was a short film by James Tenney. James addressed the issue of Cerebral Palsy and its impacts on those who have this condition. Most of our community would be aware that Angus Thompson, a fellow Year 10 student of James Tenney, has Cerebral Palsy which confines him to a wheelchair and which has greatly affected the way Angus has lived his life. Angus courageously was a central focal point of the film and both his contribution and the way the film allowed him to express himself made for a most touching cinematic experience. The film was informative, it demonstrated great empathy and provided important insights into a young man's life. The student body watched in spell-bound silence and interest. Very well done to James and to Angus, Rosemary and Wendy who all featured in the film. Superb!

Students are reminded that nominations for inclusion in our Short Film Festival to be held on Friday evening September 12th, should be submitted to the Headmaster by Friday, September 5th.

FATHERS' DAY

Fathers' Day is next Sunday September 7th. Stannies is celebrating Fathers' Day on Wednesday morning September 3rd. As was the case last year, we invite Fathers, Sons, Grandfathers and other significant males in the lives of our students to join us for Mass at 7.30am and for a hearty breakfast in the Senior Refectory from 8am. Last year this gathering was a great success and it would be encouraging to see even larger numbers attend this year. To cater for breakfast we will need some feedback on numbers, so please encourage you son to notify his Tutor of your attendance.

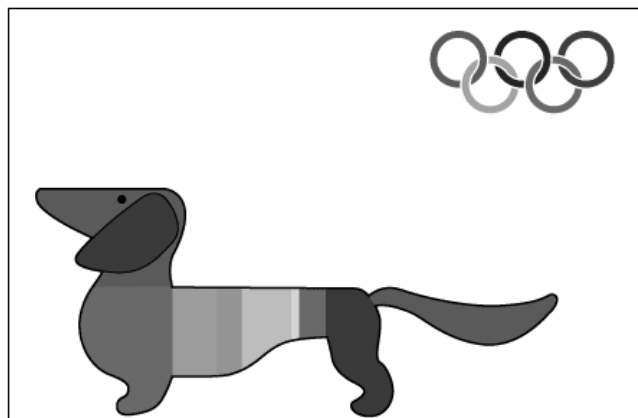
Someone in your life who encouraged/inspired you to read:

HISTORY CORNER

This week in history - The 1972 Munich Olympics

The Munich Olympics, opening on the 27th August 1972, were the second Olympics to be held in Germany, after the 1936 Games in Berlin. The Munich Olympics were intended to present a new, democratic and optimistic Germany to the world, as shown by its official motto, "The Happy Games". The emblem of the Games was a blue solar logo (the "Bright Sun"). The Olympic mascot, the dachshund "Waldi", was the first officially-named Olympic mascot. However, this joyful mood was ruined by the killings of 11 Israeli athletes by Palestinian terrorists in an event known as the Munich massacre. Unfortunately this has overshadowed the memory of the games.

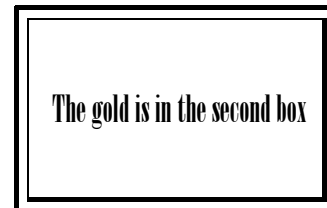

Stannies booked a place in the semi-finals of the state wide Waratah Shield for the 3rd consecutive year following a comprehensive win over Terrigal High School on Tuesday. Stannies started poorly and were lucky to lead at halftime 17-12, following tries to Jack Hart and Billy Veitch. James Toole had kicked very well with 2 difficult conversions and a penalty goal. Stannies showed some much stronger form in the second half, scoring 7 tries with much better continuity. The try scorers were Billy Veitch with a second try, Barton Whiteley, Sam George, Marc Roufeil, Michael Oriel, Sam Roberson and James Toole. Bobbie Brown and Mitch Evers added conversions, while James Toole struck the posts twice from the sideline in an unlucky kicking display.

The Callen Cup winner and best player on the field was Jack Hart who ran with gusto and worked hard around the paddock. He was well supported by second rowers Angus Cleaver and James Elliott, while Sam Roberson is now playing at his peak just 2 weeks before his Australian Schools debut. In the backs James Toole was very creative and continued to take excellent options, while Barton Whiteley and Ben Patrick had fine games in both attack and defense.
